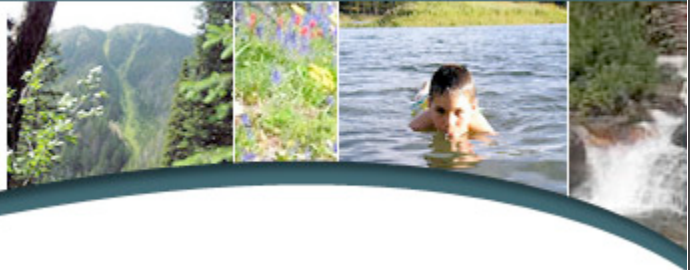

- Glacier is 95 percent wilderness and is managed as such already;
- Wilderness designation will actually provide more protection for the park from management decisions made in the future that could damage Glacier's wilderness heritage; and
- Protecting the Park will prevent industrial development in the Canadian headwaters of the North Fork! We think that a Glacier Park wilderness goes hand-in-hand with two other essential conservation measures: (1) *establishing a Whitefish Range*

Wilderness and (2) retiring dormant oil and gas leases in the North Fork on the Flathead Forest.

Glacier Park Superintendent, Chas Cartwright, noted, "The National Park Service supports ongoing efforts to protect the entire North Fork watershed. Glacier National Park's recommended wilderness proposal is an acknowledgment that there's still work to be done in accomplishing this preservation mandate. Formal wilderness designation would clearly demonstrate our commitment on this side of the border".
